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PROFILE.... RON WRIGHT

Because Ron's Dad was a Radio Operator/ Gunner on a B-26 during WWII, Ron was exposed to and became interested in 'airplanes' at an early age. He 'read' illustrated/pictured airplane books, built models, and at age 8 actually began flying lessons in an Aeronca Champ — which was owned by his Dad and Uncle. These early lessons consisted of the "ground—up" learning technique which allowed Ron to wash and dry the Champ; help push it to the gas pump; clean the windows; and YES, FINALLY get to go for a ride in the plane on a given Sunday afternoon! During that period, Ron also had the opportunity to 'take lessons' in a DGA Howard; a BT-13; a J-3 Cub and an old bi-These times were really the "good oledays."

After completing two year of college, Ron decided to "Join the Service and see the World." enlisted in the U.S.A.F. and was trained as a Para-Medic, and was eventually transferred to West Germany — being assigned to a helicopter rescue detachment. This proved to be an interesting assignment as the Para-Medic's aircraft position was the co-pilots seat and these units were constantly deployed to various training exercise areas, such as England, France, Italy, Spain, Africa, Turkey, Belgium, Scotland, etc. Approximately 1/3 of Ron's 3 year Germany tour was spent outside of Germany! This travel opportunity was really GREAT! Having to occupy the co-pilot seat allowed Ron to fly the HH-43-B helicopter (in transit) to give the pilot "a break."

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Ron has over 100 hours "P.I.C." time and over 500 hours crew-member flight time in the HH-43-B.

Ron began formal flying lessons at Mt. Hawley Airport in 1972. Sam Sisk was Ron's primary/initial instructor and persevered thru the experience until Ron got his Private License. THANKS SAM! Ron then enrolled at Byerly with Mac and Jean and obtained a Commercial; Instrument; Multi-engine Land; Single engine Sea; Certified Flight Instructor and Ground Instructor ratings.

Ron has owned a '46 Taylorcraft; Cessna 140; Globe Swift and is currently test flying a homebuilt Cougar—Tailwind. Ron tributes the rebuild project to many E.A.A. Chapter members and flying friends who have all helped him, over the past several years, to get the Cougar into the air. THANKS EVERYBODY!

Ron has held various Chapter 563 offices; participates in the Annual North Central E.A.A. Old Fashioned Fly-In at Sterling-Rock Falls, and flies for the Illinois Valley Parachute Club. Ron has also recently been designated as an E.A.A. Flight Advisor.

AVIATION SAFETY — EDUCATION SEMINAR

An Accident Prevention Program and Operation Raincheck by the Peoria, IL Air Traffic Control Tower will be held on Wednesday March 15th and Thursday March 16th from 7:00 PM until 9:30 PM each night at the Squadron Operation — Red Room, Building No. 18, Peoria Army National Guard, on the East side of the Greater Peoria Airport, on Harmon Highway.

Topics covered during these two sessions will include, AFSS Services, Army Guard Operations, Pilot Proficiency Awards Program, Causal Factors of Accidents, ATC Procedures, Update on Greater Peoria Airport, New C-130 Aircraft, and Navigation and Communication Equipment.

In addition, pilots can schedule a "Plug—In" session at Peoria Tower, consisting of one (1) hour on a control position in the tower and and one (1) hour on a position in the radar room (TRACON). This will enable each pilot to observe everything that the controller sees, hears and does.

HOMEBUILT AIR FORCE

Some cash-conscious military forces are liking to the homebuilt and kitbuilt aircraft sectors for their equipment. The Nigerian Air Force has recently taken delivery of the first batch of AIEP Air Beetle T18s, a locally developed production version of the Van's RV-6A, 60 of which are on order. The Air Beetle features extensive modifications to make it suitable for the primary trainer role, and is powered by a 180-hp Lycoming O-360-A1A capable of running on auto-gas because avgas is not always available in Nigeria. Air Beetles are being manufactured at the rate of three per month by Aeronautical Industrial Engineering and Project Management (AIEP) at Kaduna, and the airplanes are replacing British Aerospace Bulldogs in the Nigerian Air Force. Eventually all 200 pilots in the Nigerian Air Force will have their own Van's RV-6A. FLASH! AIEP plans to market the airplane outside Nigeria.

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difference in prices, I was too. The company's SWC code is 7168 for a 12-quart case.
