September Our next Chapter meeting will be on the **Second** Thursday of the month, **September 14th**, at 7:00 p.m. at our Chapter Hangar at Mt. Hawley Airport.

Our guest speakers will be Jim Martin and his wife Colleen, who teaches at Wilder-Waite School. They will give us an update on the 70% replica mock up

of the "Spirit of St. Louis" that the students are building.

The Martins addressed our May Chapter meeting with a proposal for the project and we agreed to provide labor to help build the mock up.

The students at Wilder-Waite have made a lot of progress and the "Spirit of St. Louis" is being assembled in a rented storage space across from the school. This fall there will be a program in the school gym. The students will experience first hand the time it took and the dangers associated with Lindberg's first nonstop flight across the Atlantic.

Last Month We assembled on Thursday, August 10th at 7:00 p.m. Treasurer Morrie Caudill called the meeting to order at 7:20 p.m. in the Chapter hangar at Mt Hawley. Vice-President Ric Waldow served as the acting Secretary. The minutes from the last meeting were read and approved.

Young Eagles Report: The 08/05/00 event was canceled. There was discussion about the organization and reasons for canceling. The event was canceled the prior to Thursday, August 3rd, due to a potential lack of pilots. Weather would have precluded the event on Saturday August 5th anyway, as one member was weathered in that morning on his way to breakfast. Radar was showing

feet to the west and around 10:00 a.m. all **\$@!@%& broke lose.

There is another Young Eagles event scheduled for Saturday, September 2nd. We hope to have approximately 35 Young Eagles ready for flights. All pilots are encouraged to participate in these events. Member pilots with four passenger aircraft are especially needed due to the higher efficiency in providing rides to large numbers of children.

B17 "Aluminum Overcast" Report: The financial results from EAA Headquarters are not in yet, but the estimate is that the Chapter should net approximately \$3,500 to \$4,000. It was a great success with 16 passenger flights being taken, all sold out.

The details of the revenue calculations were not available at the meeting, however the Chapter receives 20% of the gate admission on tours, 15% of merchandise, and a small portion of the fare for each passenger booked by the Chapter.

More flights could have been sold on Monday, however the aircraft was not available due to a routine, 30-hour, inspection. The Chapter also sold beverages, which were 100% profit, as Al Phipps persuaded the local Pepsi distributor to donate the soda.

One expense was paying Morrie Caudill's monthly cell phone bill. The week of the B-17 visit there was a high volume of calls, all pertaining to the scheduling of riders and volunteers.

The Chapter has a listing of all the passengers on the B17 flights and it was recommended that they be invited to the next meeting, to increase participation in EAA at the local level.

(Editor's Note: Since the August meeting the Chapter has received a check from Oshkosh for \$5,140.00. Apparently the B-17 visit was an even bigger success than we realized!)

August Breakfast

Report: Sam Sisk reported there were only 11 people for breakfast on Saturday the 5th. He had \$45 to submit to the treasury. The low attendance was partially due to inclement weather that morning and the fact that many members had spent the first part of the week at Oshkosh.

Treasurer's Report:

The books were not current, but without the B-17 receipts, the balance should be approximately \$4,500.

Oh What a Flight! By Ric and Lisa Waldow


At the August Chapter meeting **Jim Hannemann** presented a Flight Advisor's report describing his Oshkosh

trip. This provided several lessons to all present in proper flight preparation and pilot



preparedness. The details of his presentation will follow, however the important points are:

- 1. Have a patient and understanding wife.
- Have a patient and understanding boss, or have one who takes lots of vacations, or be independently wealthy.
- Pride has no place in determining pilot qualifications or making weather decisions.
- 4. Cross-country flight in 60-year-old open cockpit biplanes is as reliable as modern commuter airlines.



While away for Reserve duty for two weeks, Jim received a call checking his availability to fly from New York State to Oshkosh in a freshly restored Waco UPF-7

(NC29303).

The owner, Richard Ash of Piffard, NY, had just received it 2 weeks earlier from restorer John Shue. Despite experience in a Baron and a Cessna 140, Ash was not ready to solo the Waco, much less make a long VFR cross-country.

Jim is on the Board of the American Waco Club and is their Fly-In Chairman. Restorer John Shue suggested Jim for the flight. Ash arranged for a Cessna 310 to take Jim out to NY on Tuesday afternoon.

Thus with one day back at work, Jim headed off for a vacation trip to Oshkosh. They were to depart Wednesday for OSH and hoped that the severe weather systems between NY and OSH would give them a window to sneak through. At this point the thought of being stuck out somewhere with no hangar and a beautiful antique was not appealing to the either Jim or Ash. With these comforting thoughts, they took off for the 600 NM trip in a VFR only airplane that was straight out of a restoration and had 10 hours flight time in the last 30 years.

The first two stops, on grass strips in Mount Vernon OH and Lowell IN went well, despite winds forecast to be 25 knots (remember Antique biplane taildragger). The next

landing, after circling south of Chicago to remain over farm ground – NOT Lake Michigan or suburban development, was at Dodge County in Juno WI. Although this airport has several runways to minimize the crosswind component, this was to be Jim's first pavement landing in this aircraft.

It was at this point that the owner disclosed to Jim that he had spent \$203,000 on restoring the aircraft. Jim landed successfully the second time, after doing a touch and go just to demonstrate his mastery of the aircraft under adverse weather and psychological conditions (that's how an instructor describes a bounced landing/go around).

After OSH re-opened the field following the air show, the duo flew the short distance up to OSH only to have the tower change runways and approaches on them. You have to be heads up for changing conditions and traffic at all times.

After parking in the Antique area, the ritual of removing suicidal bugs was performed (note: always clean the lower wing first of positive stagger biplanes. Failure to do so is not fatal, however it clearly identifies a rookie). The owner of the aircraft was educated that cleaning bugs is an enjoyable activity, and a by-product of good pilot judgment exercised by landing on grass runways whenever possible.

The airplane won the **Antique Bronze Lindy for Champion Customized Aircraft** at the Monday night awards ceremony, so the effort was worthwhile.

The next morning Ash found a business card left in his cowling. It was from "Jim Franklin Airshows." Franklin flies the jet powered Waco UPF7. On the back of the card was written, "Your Waco is absolutely beautiful," signed Jim Franklin.

Departure from Oshkosh was Tuesday morning, so after breaking camp and thanking Al Lurie for his hospitality and help during their stay, it was time to head back to NY. By departure time it was raining, so the duo spent the

remainder of the morning keeping updated on the three weather checks. It did not look promising.

Just prior to the air show there was a window of opportunity so they started their homeward journey. They made intermediate stops in Kankakee IL, and Findley OH (overnight). On Wednesday they made it back to NY, despite fog in the morning and thunderstorms in the afternoon.

The return trip to Peoria was not as successful, as the commuter airline connection from Chicago to Peoria ended up being canceled late at night. The final part of Jim's journey was by rental car. So if you really want to be somewhere either drive or fly an antique airplane.
